As our Year 1 children were on a trip the Mayoral party very kindly brought the Loving Cup and buns to school for them the next day and they also brought buns for our nursery children.




NURSERY The story of Jack and the Beanstalk inspired the nursery children to start making up stories of their own. The children have planted magic beans in their nursery garden and have also planted sunflower seeds to take home to plant in their own garden. If you have any spare plastic plant pots at home the nursery would appreciate them. The nursery was donated some tadpoles that were found in a small pond that was about to dry up. The children have observed the tadpoles closely to see how they are changing and watched how they have grown legs over time. At present there are small froglets in the tank.

RECEPTION Our reception classes received a very special delivery of living eggs recently and a special incubator. They have been fascinated to watch the eggs hatch into chicks and have seen how quickly they grow. This has led them to read the story of The Little Red Hen.



They have looked at different eggs such as duck and quail eggs in addition to chicken eggs. Experiments have been carried out to see if they could make eggs bounce and float. They have looked at the different sizes of egg yolks too. All this work has led to them making story maps and books.



The children have also been keeping tadpoles and have watched their development.



BEACH CLEAN St Ives Youth Council has organised a beach clean at St Ives Harbour. The Youth Council has regular meetings in St Ives Guildhall and our school has two Year 2 representatives on the Council. Staff members Leone Pulley and Wendy Goodman are involved with this.

Our school council has created posters to advertise this event. We are hoping that as many parents and children as possible would like to help. VIOLIN LESSONS Our Year 1 children have been having violin lessons with Violin teacher, Hannah Birt. These have been whole class lessons and the children have really loved every minute of this time.



Individual group lessons are also available for Reception and Year 2 children. These will cost £5 per lesson but are free to children who are currently entitled to Pupil Premium funding. This cost is dependent on there being sufficient numbers for a group lesson. Please call into the office for more information.



BREAKFAST CLUB Just a reminder that we are unable to accept children at breakfast club after 8.30 in the morning. Children can arrive at any time between 7.45 am and 8.30 am. There is no need to book. Breakfast Club costs £2 per day,

but is free to Pupil Premium children.

AFTER SCHOOL A couple of teachers have mentioned that they have been concerned about the safety of some children after school when they are playing before going home. Children have been observed climbing on railings and walls. The children's behaviour and safety after school is, of course, their parents' responsibility and it is essential that their play is fully supervised at this time. While this issue only applies to a minority of children I wanted to bring it to everyone's attention to raise awareness. Thank you for your co-operation.

STAFFING Miss Esther Leonard Williams has been working at St Hilary School for a few weeks to gain experience in another setting. This is usual for teachers in their qualifying year. During her absence Mrs Steele has been working for five days per week instead of two.



Several members of staff have recently attended paediatric first aid training which means that a large nucleus of our staff are up to date with first aid procedures.

YEAR 1 The Year 1 children enjoyed a trip to Newquay Zoo recently. They attended a workshop at the Zoo as well as seeing all the animals. Leading up to this they were very busy making and selling healthy snacks to help to fund the trip.



YEAR 2 The children from Sandpiper and Cormorant class have been working very hard doing their national assessment tests. They have enjoyed a very interesting visit to the Porthmeor Sail Lofts where Mr Chris Care spoke to them about fishing and mending nets.

They have also been sketching on the harbour and carrying out a tally chart linked to the different kinds of boats in the harbour.



At the Leach pottery the children made clay tiles and watched a potter at work.



The children have carried out a range of science experiments including trying to keep a gingerbread man dry! They shared their wonderful homework linked to the harbour with each other.

50th ANNIVERSARY POTTERY
